PEAK Bodies

PEAK bodies represent and support specific groups within the educational community. This group plays a crucial role in advocacy, policy development, professional development, and ensuring that the interests of our members are addressed at national and regional levels. Other roles include networking and resource provision. NZASA will continue to be represented in this group. Other members include:

Between late 2024 and March 2025, our education system underwent several significant changes affecting schools nationwide. These comprehensive changes reflect the government's efforts to enhance educational outcomes, address attendance issues, and provide diverse schooling options, while also navigating challenges related to cultural and language policies. Curriculum Reforms

- **Structured Literacy and Mathematics:** In 2025, primary schools were mandated to implement structured approaches to teaching reading, writing, and mathematics for Years 0-3. This initiative included the distribution of over 450,000 curriculum-aligned workbooks to students, aiming to enhance foundational skills.
- Curriculum Content Updates: Schools were required to adopt updated content for English, Te Reo Rangatira (Years 0-6), Mathematics, and Pāngarau (Years 0-8). Additionally, the introduction of 20- and 40-week phonics checks for Year 1 students was encouraged to bolster literacy development.

Assessment and Reporting Adjustments

NCEA Changes: Secondary schools were advised to engage with draft versions of the English (Years 7-13) and Mathematics and Statistics (Years 9-13) curricula. They were also required to utilise updated Achievement Standards for NCEA assessments, with the discontinuation of submitted reports as a method of external assessment for NCEA Level 1.

Attendance Policies

Revised Attendance Codes: From Term 1 2025, schools were mandated to use updated attendance
codes and report daily attendance data. The introduction of the Stepped Attendance Response (STAR)
framework was encouraged to address and reduce absenteeism.

Classroom Release Time

• Increased Non-Teaching Time: As part of collective bargaining agreements, classroom release time for Years 0-6 teachers in our Area Schools has increased to 25 hours per term. Additionally, permanent salary unit holders received new allocations for classroom release time.

Reintroduction of Charter Schools

New Charter Schools: The government reintroduced charter schools, with seven institutions opening
in early 2025. These schools offer diverse educational approaches, including Māori immersion
programmes and specialised curricula targeting disengaged youth.

School Lunch Programme Modifications

• *Ka Ora Ka Ako Programme:* Schools participating in the Ka Ora, Ka Ako programme transitioned to a new model in 2025. This change aimed to streamline the programme and address previous challenges related to meal quality and delivery. National providers of the programme are struggling to meet needs e.g. Libelle Liquidating early this week.

Māori Language Policies

Te Reo Māori Usage: In late 2024, concerns were raised about government policies limiting the use of
te reo Māori in public services, potentially impacting the language's revitalisation efforts. Several
ministries ceased using Māori names and languages in official documents and stopped funding
language courses for staff. A recent example is the Ministry's planned 'repurposing' of funds currently
used for Resource Teachers Literacy and Resource Teachers Māori.

Consultation Standards for the teaching profession

Teaching standards outline expectations for all teachers to meet. They are also a framework for teachers to continue to reflect and further develop their knowledge and practice over time, supported by their fellow teachers, principals, and professional leaders. The current *Ngā Paerewa mō te Umanga Whakaakoranga* | *Standards for the Teaching Profession* were developed in 2016 and 2017 by teachers, principals, early childhood leaders and the Teaching Council. Much has changed since then, and the teaching profession and society have continued to grow and evolve.

Principal Development 2025

Principal Development Map Work update 2025

Tim White, the Chief Advisor for the Leadership Advisory Programme and his team have developed and implemented the *Principal Development Map framework* in 2023. Linked *HERE* is the most up-to-date version of the framework with the changes made as they were tested with the advisory group members. The group is now interested in receiving feedback about the usefulness of this resource.

Beginning Principal PLD Refresh 2025

The current beginning principal support provided by Evaluation Associates and Te Akatea concludes at the end of 2025. The MOE Leadership Advisory group is now considering a "refresh" of what is currently offered and also looking at the support for beginning principals in the context of a potential Aspiring Principals Programme.
